

Chatt Fest Country Fair

Here's a riddle: what's dreary on the outside and sunny on the inside? The answer is the 300 families, friends, and businesses who bundled up in layers and enjoyed the Chatt Fest Country Fair on November 12 at Hutcheson Ferry Park.

Under the Heritage Tent, fairgoers viewed the displays of photos and essays decorated with colorful award ribbons in red, white, and blue – the winners in the Time Capsule Photo & Essay Contests. In the center aisle, the Time Capsule was on display for all to see, surrounded by the many entries contributed by the community for future generations to enjoy. In the back of the tent, the new-old heritage map from the 1800s was on display along with the City's proclamation expressing gratitude to the Heritage Families who have lived in and worked to build the area that is now Chattahoochee Hills for more than 100 years. And in the front of the tent was the Crème de la Crème – the Blue Ribbon Contest for jams & jellies, cakes, and crafts, eagerly attended by three tasteful judges and a tag-along crowd of hopeful cake tasters.

Surrounding the perimeter of the park's open field, 25 vendors set up shop selling their local wares, offering business advice, and even giving a hands-on demo of goat milking. Eight churches were on hand to offer games and fun activities for kids and to manage the inflatable bouncy house and 3-1 carnival game station. Casablanca, the featured food vender, did such a booming business that they had to make a quick run back to their shop in Palmetto to restock; and yes, the mayor got his wish and finally had a funnel cake from YummY's.

In the center stage, two bands kept the spirits lively throughout the afternoon. False Hearted Lovers greeted fairgoers with their opening act featuring Bluegrass and Country Western Honky-Tonk. Kris Youmans Band added flair to the celebration program and great music the rest of the afternoon. In between, Mayor Tom Reed led the Celebration Program with gratitude to the elected officials & staff who have served the city for the past 10 years, and to the community for its ongoing support in making Chatt Hills great. The mayor announced the Blue Ribbon and Essay Contest winners and then closed the ceremony by honoring the Heritage Families of Chatt Hills.

At the end of the day, with the tents, and stages, and vendors all packed and gone and Hutcheson Ferry Park returned to its natural state, the happy spirit of the community seemed to linger, a silent tribute to the place we call home.

If I Were Mayor of Chattahoochee Hills
